#### **Dear Residents**

We hope this newsletter finds you well. As we continue to work towards making our community a better place, we would like to remind you of the importance of reporting any defects or issues that you may come across in and around our village with the launch of our "Don't Walk By "campaign.



By reporting any issue, yourselves, you can help us maintain the safety and quality of our community and environment. Please don't rely on others or think its so obvious that someone else would have reported it.

Its is important that whilst Surrey County Council and Reigate and Banstead Borough Council claim they are committed to ensuring that all reported issues are addressed properly and efficiently. There have been many occasions where councillors have been asked to look into issues such as potholes and road flooding for example where they haven't been reported through the correct channels and issues tend to get lost or forgotten about which understandably causes frustration to our residents when issues are not resolved when they think they have been reported when if fact they haven't.

Every time an issue is reported by a resident this is logged, and a unique reference number is then generated. By completing these reports and "not walking on by" the Council and your local council officials become accountable for the action or lack of action which is then taken.

Let's work together and "Don't Walk By" and report it. Even if it has been reported by someone else as any duplications show the importance of these issues to residents.


As you can imagine common examples include broken street furniture, potholes, blocked drains, and excessive weeds to name a few.

So how do you report an issue and who is responsible?

Surrey County Council and Reigate and Banstead Borough Council are separate organisations and as such they have different statutory responsibilities for providing services within the community.

The following table shows items that can be reported through the Surrey County Council Website.

As you can see, they are responsible for a range of issues to support a safe community. The website is easy to use and when reporting an issue, you can easily take a photograph at the time and upload these as a picture. What do they say? "A picture is worth a thousand words".

If you haven't got a camera, that's no problem it's not a requirement and I appreciate that some residents may not be able to access the internet so there is the main contact centre telephone number 03456 009 009 (9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday, excluding bank holidays)

So if the item is not on the Surrey County Council list above, then its more than likely the responsibility will be down to Reigate and Banstead Borough Council

# **Update from Cllr Rebecca Paul**

## Proposed Expansion of Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty

Reigate & Banstead has some of the most beautiful countryside in the country. From Reigate Heath to Chipstead Downs, we have an abundance of amazing landscapes and breathtaking views on our door step. And that's why the Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) designation is so important. It protects some of our most naturally beautiful land ensuring that it is conserved for future generations.



And it's for all these reasons that I welcome Natural England's plans to expand the Surrey Hills AONB to protect even more of our local land.

The main changes proposed to the boundary of relevance for Lower Kingswood are as follows:

#### **Headley Hills**

To protect the pastoral and ancient woodland surrounding the village of Headley, the existing border is proposed to extend northwards up to the M25 towards Walton on the Hill taking in the area including Costal Wood, Frith Park and Queens Wood. The boundary expansion is proposed to stop at the M25 leaving Langley Vale and Banstead Heath outside the AONB, largely for reasons of M25 noise.

#### Chipstead

To protect the chalk valleys and ancient semi-natural woodland in this area, the existing border is proposed to extend northwards towards the urban fringes of Kingswood and Chipstead taking in part of Lower Kingswood and Banstead Woods.

A public consultation on the proposed changes ran earlier this year, and the responses are still being reviewed by Natural England. One of the concerns raised is that too much onus is placed on 'relative tranquillity' in determining eligible areas, which is especially detrimental for landscapes close to the M25. We should know by the end of this year whether or not Natural England will propose further expansion of the boundary in response to the public consultation.

# Relocation of Police public-facing front counter

Reigate Police Station public-facing front counter has been relocated to Caterham Police Station (CR3 6LD). This is due to Reigate Police Station, including the public facing front counter area being built with Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC). So for health & safety concerns the counter has had to be moved. The counter hours at Caterham will remain the same as at Reigate 08:00 - 22:00 seven days a week excluding Christmas Day.

Reigate & Banstead's local Neighbourhood Policing Teams, who spend much of their time away from the police station patrolling & responding to 999 emergency calls, will remain based at the Reigate Police Station maintaining local policing presence.

## **Unwanted items**

After our last front page article about the Recycling Centre in Stubbs Lane we were contacted by a resident who informed us that they worked for a company that collects most unwanted household items, that are in good condition, right from people's doorsteps, which would be handy for the elderly or those who don't drive. They also donate a portion to charity for every collection. We were advised that in areas where this is used a lot it has helped to tackle some of the dumping issues. They also collect unwanted electrical items, books and bric-a-brac which a lot of companies don't.

by the Kingswood Village Hall Trust, purchased a bench for the recreation ground to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II.

Sadly, very soon after it was installed, the bench was subject to an act of vandalism that left it lying in pieces. Lower Kingswood Residents' Association (LKRA) had hoped that Reigate and Banstead Council may be able to repair the bench and it was duly collected by council employees. The Green Spaces team were unable to do it until they had more staff available. On making a third enquiry as to any progress it was found out that unfortunately, lack of storage facilities and resources meant that the council was unable to carry out the repair and it was disposed of. Fortunately the brass plaque was returned to the LKRA to be put on to another bench.

Recognising that our residents have been deprived of not only a pleasant place to sit but also a commemoration of the Jubilee, we are keen to provide a replacement bench. At a cost of up to £600 for a robust replacement, LKRA is not in a position to fund the total cost of a new bench. We are, therefore, looking to our community, whether individuals or local businesses, to help us raise the funds required or even source a new bench.

We have a new pond in the wildlife area, and in the next month or so will repair the roof of the old stable and put in in new guttering/downpipes, which will go to new water butts and then a pipeline to the pond.

We already see Badgers, Foxes, Deer, etc, in the area and once everything is established we hope it will become a very useful 'community area' for our wildlife.


# **Girlguiding**

# **Grassland management on the Banstead Commons**

The UK has lost 97% of its wildflower meadows since the second world war. We are proud that Natural England have judged that the grassland areas on the Banstead Commons are in favourable condition. Our dedicated management has enabled rare and vulnerable chalk-loving plants and animals to return and flourish. In particular, butterfly populations across all four sites have increased dramatically this year, despite rather variable summer weather.



Approximately half of the 1350 acres of Banstead Commons is designated "priority" grassland. Two of our chalk downland sites — Banstead Downs and Park Downs - are Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and Banstead Heath is a Site of Nature Conservation Importance (SNCI). This places a legal obligation on the

Banstead Commons Conservators to ensure that our management optimises the preservation and enhancement of their ecological health. There are three main techniques that we deploy on the Commons depending on resourcing and the topography of the grassland - essentially "cut and collect", mowing and grazing.



Ideally, we would always use the traditional pre-mechanisation

system that led to the creation of the open downland habitat and its unique flora and fauna in the first place. Where timing and resources limit our flexibility and we have to use machinery, we try to do the opposite of what most people are familiar with when you're managing your garden and allotments! The rare plants we are trying to encourage depend on the soil being nutrient-poor because there is less competition from lush and aggressive grasses and other dominant plant species. We must therefore prevent any additional nutrients from returning to the soil so the Conservators use a **Flail Mower Collector** which is similar in principle to your home lawn mower (if you fit the collecting box on the back!). Cut and collecting is time intensive. To get a clean cut the tractor must travel at low speeds, the box gets full very quickly and it has to emptied frequently well away from where we have mown, to ensure the nutrients don't leach back into the soil. If you spot a large compost pile hiding in the undergrowth on your next walk on the Heath, you will now know why it is there and that its location is not itself a "special" site!

In some areas, we have to use a **Rotary Flail.** We do this most often when managing bracken which, despite being a native plant (with an interesting ecosystem of its own) can become so "invasive" that it crowds and shades out everything else. This method is much faster, and therefore more economical, but it is less helpful to improving the grassland sward because of the "thatch" that gets left behind and adds nutrients to the soil.

Our much-preferred technique is **Conservation Grazing.** This is the most effective form of management for species-rich grasslands because it reflects our heritage that led to this valuable and attractive habitat and preserved it without external intervention until only a few years ago. Banstead Downs and Park Downs have been conservation grazed regularly by sheep for over ten years and this year we are working in collaboration with the Downlands Partnership to introduce a mixed sheep flock to Banstead Downs and goats and sheep to Park Downs. Whilst the animals are working hard to graze the woody scrub and grasses, staff are also kept very busy. Commons Legislation and our Byelaws prevent the installation of permanent fencing and we have a total of six enclosures to erect (and later dismantle) each season to ensure the livestock can be moved to new areas across the sites. We also recruit a team of volunteers to carry out daily checks on the welfare of the livestock and ensure that the perimeter fencing is secure to prevent dogs from entering the enclosures.

The Banstead Common Conservators are looking to recruit new volunteers to help us carry our grassland surveys on our site next year. If you have an interest in botany and would like to get involved, please get in touch to find out more. Training will be provided and no previous experience is required, although a passion for the natural environment and commitment to learn are essential.

# Memories of Mogador and the High Atlas

This note is triggered by the recent vivid television coverage of the tragic earthquake in the High Atlas of Morocco.

Why Mogador?

As a child in the 1950s one of my hobbies was literally reading maps, which sounds a bit sad. On the one-inch OS sheet 170, next to my home sheet, I came across the hamlet of Mogador, a name I had seen on old shipping charts in the Greenwich Maritime Museum as a port on the Atlantic coast of north Africa.

I wanted a career connected with communication or measurement. I wanted to get behind the pips which came at regular intervals from the BBC Home Service. I learnt about the BBC Engineering Research Department, & was intrigued to find that their telephone number was Mogador 2361. I decided that I would work there.

When I got a driving licence I decided to make my first trip abroad from Mogador, Surrey to Mogador, Morocco & the High Atlas. I set off from The Sportsman with a copy of their sandwich price list as evidence of my starting point. At that time it cost 58s6d to cross the channel by boat but I flew with the car from Lydd to Le Touquet for 57s6d (just under £3). I reached Spain that evening. In Gibraltar I stocked up with essentials in Lipton's before crossing continents. I collected my mail poste restante at the Post Office, as this seemed to be the thing to do when abroad. To avoid dependence on Spain fresh water was collected from slopes on the side of the rock, & some places had three water taps, hot, cold & sea.

Arrival in Africa felt like entry to the land of the bible, with men wandering about in djellabas & road signs in Arabic script. When I arrived in Mogador I decided to pitch my tent in the Police Station car park for safety. Mogador harbour was heavily fortified & had been used by Portuguese pirates as a base for attacking passing ships. Fishing was now the main activity. At the time I was there the name was being changed to Essaouira, but I found a postcard of Mogador, Maroc (port de péche) which I posted to The Sportsman. Salesmen plied me with mint tea. I resisted buying a marquetry table for about £12 ('we will deliver it to you') but I bought a wooden box with a secret opening mechanism as a souvenir. While writing this note I learnt from the internet that the name Mogador still applies to an offshore island, which is designated under Islamic rules as a place of quarantine for pilgrims returning by boat from the hajj.

I went on to Ouarzazate on the edge of the Sahara desert via a very rough route across the High Atlas mountains. No buildings could be seen but young children would appear from nowhere at the roadside offering pieces of rock with crystals growing inside. At one point I was alarmed to see the fuel gauge steadily falling towards zero. I looked under the car to see a neat column of fuel falling onto the ground. The drain plug of the petrol tank had sheared off. I whittled the conical ribbed plastic cap of a toothpaste tube & threaded it into the drain hole. I had a five-litre can of Beryl (the brand name of the local petrol). I tried every BMC dealer on my return journey but this fix lasted until I finally found a new drain plug at Caffyns in Eastbourne.

Within a month of my return to the UK, & with fewer than 4000 miles on the clock, the car was in head-on

collision in Riverhill with a car driven by an unlicensed driver who had stolen it outside a pub. I kept my registration number & the wreck was written off as JNJ 999D. The other driver was disqualified from driving for three years starting if/when he was eligible to apply for a licence.

I worked at BBC Research Department for 26 years. I bought my boss's house when he retired so I could walk to work. It gave me a Mogador telephone number, but I would have preferred the number 2307 so that I could be called by dialling MOGADOR.


Our Ladies teams have had a busy start to the season with league and friendly games, as well as




tournaments. Originally the teams played 7 v 7 but as clubs have attracted more players
